[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indcipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8<sup>th</sup> of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]


### District of Pennsylvania

On the twenty fourth day of November 1823 appeared in Open Court being a Court of Record for the ninth judicial district of Pennsylvania in the County of Franklin, Jacob Hartline aged Sixty Six Resident in Franklin County in said district who being duly sworn according to law doth on his solemn oath duly administered declare that he served in the Revolutionary War as follows "Viz." That he the said Jacob Hartline was enlisted in Shepherds Town [Shepherdstown] Virginia by Lieutenant Swartz in the year 1781 in the fall of the year (enlisted for 3 years) and continued in the service till the end of the war & was discharged at York Pennsylvania General Armong [Charles Armand Tuffin, marquis de la Rouerie], Captain Barone<sup>1</sup> commanded the company to which I was attached, Major Shaefner [perhaps George Schaffner] commanded the Regiment as will more fully appear by the rolls of the Army in the war office.

And I do solemnly swear that I was a resident Citizen of the United States on the 18<sup>th</sup> day of March 1818 and that I have not since that time by gift, sale or in any manner whatever disposed of my property or any part thereof with intent thereby so to diminish it as to bring myself within the provision of an act of Congress entitled "an act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the revolutionary war" passed on the 18<sup>th</sup> day of March 1818, and that I have not nor has any person in trust for me any property, or securities, contracts or debts due to me nor have I any income other than what is contained in the schedule hereto annexed and by me subscribed. This declarant further declares that he is by occupation a Butcher, but is unable to pursue his occupation from the effects of Fever and rheumatic pains and old age. That his family consists of a wife and five children two only of whom live at home a Girl aged about twenty-one and a boy about seventeen years of age. This declarant further states on his oath that the annexed Schedule of his property is just and true. One cow – one Stove – one Bureau and some kitchen furniture.

Sworn & subscribed in open Court this 25<sup>th</sup> day of November 1823

Personally appeared in open Court John Martin<sup>2</sup> who being sworn according to Law did depose and say that he is well acquainted with Jacob Hartline named in the foregoing Petition, that he this deponent served with Jacob Hartline in the same Company and Regiment and that they were both discharged at the same time at York Pennsylvania that he knows that Jacob Hartline served about two years in the same company & Regiment

Personally appeared before me the subscriber one of the justices of the peace in and for the said County John Martin who being duly sworn according to law did depose & say that he is well acquainted with Jacob Hartline, that he served in the same company (which was commanded by Captain Barone) with Jacob Hartline and in the same Regiment or Legion (which was commanded by General Armong) and that your deponent knows that Jacob Hartline served with your deponent one year and upwards and that Jacob Hartline was discharged at York Pennsylvania at the same time that your deponent was discharged at the same place, by General Armong.

Before me the Subscriber one of the Justices of the Peace in and for the County of York Personally came Leonard Baumgardner<sup>3</sup> of the Borough of York, in the State of Pennsylvania, Aged about 69 years, who upon his solemn oath taken according to law saith that he knew and


well recollects that Jacob Hartline was a private in Captain Barons Company of Yeagers, in General Armong Legion. And that they were enlisted for the term of 3 years, And were Regularly discharged in the Borough of York aforesaid, in the Month of October A.D. 1783 further saith not.

At the same time and place came Frederick Huebner of the Borough of York in the State of Pennsylvania Aged 71 years, who upon his Solemn oath taken according to law saith that he was enlisted in Captain Barens Company of Yeagers in General Armang Legion, and that he well remembers and knows that Jacob Hartline belonged to the same Company (as to the time of their Enlistment he cannot recollect) and that they were Enlisted for the term of 3 years, and were Regularly discharged in the Borough of York in the month of October A.D. 1783 – further saith not.
